Food for THOUGHT Services

PLASTICS – The Good Bad and the Ugly Plastics, Plastics, Plastics ...

Everywhere but not a square foot of land to stand on, no water body to dip into or drink a few drops of unpolluted water. No forest, no mountain or any other space that escaped the plastic menace.

Plastic have become the most ubiquitous man-made material on earth and also the most commonly used for multitude of purposes and certainly become the "Cannot Do Without" material. Plastics are GOOD, BAD AND UGLY.

Approximately 400 million tons of plastics is produced annually the basic raw material being the residue of the Oil Refining Industry. Some of the basic products used in the Plastic Industry are Polyethylene, Polyurethane, Nylon which are further treated physically and chemically to such the final products.

The Good about plastics is that it could be used for multitude of purposes in many sectors – Food, Clothing, Shelter, Water, Agriculture, Medicine and Surgery Industrial and others.

Food and agriculture

Plastic materials play a major role from food production to the dining table. Fertilizer and Pesticides used in agriculture come in plastic containers, the harvest is packed and transported in plastic bags or boxes. Most food items.

Food Grains, Legumes, Vegetables, Fruits, partly prepared and Cooked Food items are all packed in polythene or similar packing material. When one walks into a market, most items are packed in plastic coverages and these items such in soap are placed in yet another plastic bag and the entire collection of goods purchased is put into a large bag and perhaps a second bag to support the weight. Food served at take away and in aircraft are all packed in plastic containers.

Water

Plastic containers of many sizes are used to store water - Large. Plastic Tanks for water harvesting at community level, Container of many sizes to suit the needs at family level, plastic water jars for festivals, mass rallies, sporting events, public toilets and bathing places small plastic bottles for individuals. Domestic water tanks, pipes and accessories for water carriage dram of system are all made of plastics.

Shelter

Recycled plastic in the form of hard blocks are used to construct cheap houses for holiday homes, temporary refugee camps and for the needly accessories such as dowse and windows, water supply and sewepage pipes are all available for such needs.

Domestic needs such as those needed for food preparations food serving and dining are all available to the house holders.

Medical Services

Most medical and surgical appliances are made of synthetic materials and some of these are used only once: eliminating the need for costly and time-consuming sterling procedures.

Plastic drip sets, tubing containers for drugs and appliance and many other utensils are packed in plastics. Disposable syringes of all sizes and made of plastic. Specially made of plastics. Specially made plastic devices are used in replacement of body parts surgery and many devices are used in replacement of body parts surgery and many devices inserted into the body in surgery.

Industry

Durable light weight plastics are used widely in automobiles to make vehicles lights and the re by improve fuel.

Consumption

In transportation and manufacturing industries in order to reduce weight and hence the transport costs.

BAD – an easy to remember guidelines (Slogan) for this use of plastics in

- i. Reduce the use refuse to use
- ii. Reuse
- iii. Recycle

However, the use of plastics has not diminished even though some community and some countries have adhered to the above guidelines. In the year 2024 approximately 400 million toes of plastic have been rolldown and marketed. Only about a quarter of this quantity being recycled.

One hardly ever sees an individual rejecting or refusing a plastic bag or plastic spoon or a jug is all given with an item in order to market a product many rural industries processing packing bags, boxes etc. out of natural raw materials such as straw, reed and temp, banana three leave dosed down, due to the availability of plastics, causing rural unemployment.

Massive amount of plastics is accumulating in the Environment in the soil, degrading for agriculture in the water ways, takes and in the oceans Burning of plastics produces highly toxic substances such as Dioxin and Furan which are injurious to health plastic vapor itself is cancer causing.

Approximately 200 million form of plastic waste is popping up and down in the oceans. One of the biggest collections of plastic is called the great plastic garbage patch in the ocean adjacent to the so-called righty developed USA at is estimated that 1.89 trillion pieces of plastics which include used razors tooth brushes, ball

point pens, empty water bottles, containers of all sort – shampoos hair cream containers etc. float in the oceans.

Advantages and Disadvantage

Massive scale production, marketing and sale of many wanted and glut of unwanted consumer goods most of these packed in plastic bags and containers ultimately reach the consumer.

One sees no continuity with the 3 Rs. Reduce, reuse and recycling. All of many homes even among the literate and developed community, breathing tea in plastic jugs, consuming food in cheap plastic utensils are common occurrences.

The fact that nuclear explosions can be devastating and kill millions in a fur's moments in common knowledge that the same could happen is the human race due to the slow damage done by plastic is not intelligible to the average individual. The plastic bits and pieces break up into micro plastics.

The microplastic will further break down into narrow plastics—causing much damage to the plant and animal cells. The interference with the internal equilibria may well lead to genetic changes and break the immunity systems of plastic and animals. Human mothers may deliver NON-HUMAN BABIES and such ether unearthly happening's may be common in the future.

This "BIO-CATASTROPHY" is not far away – May be few decades from now or sooner the results would be more devastating then nuclear explosions. However, a ray of hope for humanity could well be the production enzymes by micro organic which digest the plastics convent them to innocuous substances' Neither the intelligent man non the heavens have failed to meet the challenge of plastics.
